Thank you to Barb P and Chuck N and others for tending the garden. There have been a lot of fresh vegetables for recipients of the food pantry.


Thank you to Mary B. for all she does for me and the faith community. It all makes my life much easier.

This book is a balm for preachers needing nourishment and renewal.

#### Food Pantry Report for September 2022 Newsletter

A total of 138 clients were served in July 2022, which meant 43 families were helped. So far since January 1, 2022, we have served 818 clients, which means 274 families have been helped. We could not have accomplished this without the support of our congregation and the dedicated volunteers who work at the Food Pantry.

Between July 26, 2022, and August 25, 2022, 492.4 pounds of food was donated for the Food Pantry from members of the congregation, as well as outside donors from the community. This brings the total donated so far this year to 3762.15 pounds. We are very grateful for these donations as they provide additional food that we are not always able to obtain from the GLFB or the grocery shelves.

The garden continues to produce fresh produce, especially, an abundance of tomatoes. We have also received carrots and onions from the Cramer's garden. The clients are very thrilled to have the fresh produce. The garden is producing so many tomatoes, that not only have our clients been able to take all they need, but we have been able to share them with Friendship House at MSU. Thank you to our dedicated garden volunteers.

The Food Pantry is seeking volunteers who might be able to assist with the shopping for supplies at Meijer's. There are many staples that we have been unable to obtain from the Greater Lansing Food Bank in the past several months. We are able to obtain these supplies by using our Meijer's Simply Giving cards and have been shopping there weekly. We also receive generous food donations from several families in our congregation each month. The Meijer's cards can only be used for food items and not for personal needs, so we generally pick up those supplies at Sam's or the Dollar Tree with funding from the cash donations that we receive. If anyone would be interested in helping with the shopping on occasion, please contact Bev Johnson to obtain a list of needed items and a Simply Giving Gift card to use or talk with Bev or Tracy Collins regarding the personal needs obtained at the Dollar Tree.

The Food Pantry is still seeking volunteers who are able to work on Wednesday evenings and Thursday afternoon pantry distribution days. If you would like to help, please contact Bev Johnson or Tracy Collins.



**International Ministry Teaching Opportunity**

The Friendship House at Michigan State University is seeking

volunteers to teach our International Students, beginning early September. The teaching positions provide amazing opportunities to minister to people from around the globe, whether they are here in East Lansing or attending from somewhere else in the world.

**We are seeking teaching volunteers who are either experienced teachers, or those who may lack that experience, but have a strong desire to positively impact the lives of others.** We at the Friendship House are very willing to assist our volunteer teachers, if necessary, in developing a curriculum to work with our International Students and provide whatever other help may be needed. We greatly appreciate all of those who graciously volunteer their time and effort to teach those who come to the Friendship House seeking our assistance.

### **What you need to know:**

- Our core curriculum is English as a Second Language (ESL), which can be taught in many forms, including Bible studies and others (for example, we have had a request for a course on the rules of American football).
- Our next semester begins on September 6 and finishes by the first week of December.
- Our volunteers teach one class per week up to an hour and a half per class within the window of the semester timeframe (the number of weeks is determined by the curriculum and your availability).
- All classes are presented in a hybrid (in-person and virtual via Zoom) format, which allows both teachers and students to attend either in-person or from a remote location.
- Classes are held weekdays between the hours of 9 am and 5 pm Eastern time.

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## **Reflections**

### **Accepting Change**

There are some days when I hang in suspended animation, like that cartoon character who leaves his body and watches the fracas that he is causing. He hovers above the action, but remains detached and observant, rather than engaged in the fray below. I've been feeling that way lately. This usually signals a need for a fresh perspective, a

need to replace the resignation that things are not going to change with new vigor and enthusiasm. When I was working, I hovered above the daily fervent activities of my colleagues. I noted just how pointless their incessant actions really were. They ran around with their hair on fire, so convinced that their next action was surfacing the missing piece in the puzzle, that their finger would be the one that plugged the hole in the dike, and that they alone had the power to “save the day!” Now that I am retired and living with a healing issue, I feel much the same, with doctors, nurses and caregivers, instead of employees.

I know how it is to get caught up in the frantic pace and to believe that I might have the power to make a difference. It is a blessing now to be able to detach from the frantic behavior of others and to attain an attitude of peacefulness. I try to fully understand the magnitude of the issues that surround me. I also know the potential dire outcomes, if things don't change. But I feel blessed to know that real change comes from this place of perspective. Real, substantive change does not come about through flurry of actions and cries of blame. Real, substantive change must be worked on diligently and slowly and with great care. We all need to have our minds prepared to grow into a different way of thinking, a new way of seeing and a desire from within to make things better. Life is about change, so why not embrace it, love it and live it out in everything you do? So today, I choose to hover and not engage, to not flail my arms and cry out blame. Today I choose to look beneath the surface and search for the real issues that are driving the frenzy. Today I choose to gather those sages among us who also can see the substantive issues and together we will begin to bring about the changes that are needed. Slowly, but surely, we will build a capability to see with new eyes and to act in new ways. Thanks be to God for new perspective and renewed energy.

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**Did You Know**

***His Eye is on the Sparrow***

The theme of the song is inspired by the words of David in the Psalms and Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew in the Bible: *"I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye"* (Psalm 32:8). *"Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?"* (Matthew 6:26) and *"Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear ye not therefore, ye are of more value than many sparrows"* (Matthew 10:29–31).

Civilla Martin, who wrote the lyrics, said of her inspiration to write the song based on the scriptures:

Early in the spring of 1905, my husband and I were sojourning in Elmira, New York. We contracted a deep friendship for a couple by the name of Mr. and Mrs. Doolittle—true saints of God. Mrs. Doolittle had been bedridden for nigh twenty years. Her husband was an incurable cripple who had to propel himself to and from his business in a wheelchair. Despite their afflictions, they lived happy Christian lives, bringing inspiration and comfort to all who knew them. One day while we were visiting with the Doolittles, my husband commented on their bright hopefulness and asked them for the

secret of it. Mrs. Doolittle's reply was simple: "His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me." The beauty of this simple expression of boundless faith gripped the hearts and fired the imagination of Dr. Martin and me. The hymn "His Eye Is on the Sparrow" was the outcome of that experience.


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Why should I feel discouraged, why should the shadows come,
