As Bev shares her faith, we consider Luke 17:5-10 (NRSV):

⁵ The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" ⁶ The Lord replied, "If you had faith the size of a^[a] mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

⁷ "Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? ⁸ Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me; put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? ⁹ Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? ¹⁰ So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!'

The disciples were genuine in their demand for greater faith. They want to know how they can have enough faith for radical forgiveness. Instead of giving them an answer Jesus tells them about faith the size of a mustard seed. Faith is not only to God's will but includes complete humble obedience to God's will and doing whatever God calls us to do. Faith is a gift of the Holy Spirit, but the amount of faith isn't as important as is the right kind of faith - faith in our all-powerful God. Martin Luther says in his Preface to Romans, "Faith is a work of God in us, which changes us . . . and makes us completely different people in heart, mind, senses, and all our powers." Luther says that we are to ask God to work such faith in us through prayer, a faith that does not stop to ask if good works are to be done but is busy and active, always doing good for our neighbor. Luther also says in a tract *On the Freedom of a Christian* where Luther says by faith

alone, God sets a person utterly, completely, free in Christ. We are lord of all, subject to none. Love binds us as an utterly dutiful servant to the neighbor, subject to everyone. The paradox of Christian freedom then plays out in faith and love.

Now we turn our attention to the future. It is with great sadness and joy we wish Norma and husband Linn happiness in their future and their condo in Florida during the winter. She made my life much easier at St. Paul and will be in our hearts moving forward. The potluck in her honor and her excellent service to St. Paul was well attended and the generous folks at St. Paul were able to give then a gift card for over \$1,100.00 dollars. The Human Resources Committee is now interviewing for the Office Manager position. This comes at a time when it is difficult to find people.

Thank you to Barb P and Chuck N and others for tending the garden so there were a lot of fresh vegetable for recipients of the food pantry and children were able to receive a pumpkin from the garden. The garden will now be rototilled, ready for next Spring.

October is Pastor Appreciation Month

Food Pantry Report for October 2022 Newsletter



St. Paul Pantry

A total of 121 clients were served in August 2022, which meant 41 families were helped. So far since January 1, 2022, we have served 939 clients, which means 315 families have been helped. We could not have accomplished this without the support of our congregation and the dedicated volunteers who work at the Food Pantry.

Between August 26, 2022, and September 25, 2022, 583 pounds of food was donated for the Food Pantry from members of the congregation, as well as outside donors from the community. This brings the total donated so far this year to 4,345.15 pounds. We are very grateful for these donations as they provide additional food that we are not always able to obtain from the GLFB or the grocery shelves.

We would like to thank our dedicated garden volunteers for all of their hard work this summer, as well as individuals in the congregation who have donated from their own gardens. The clients have truly enjoyed the bounty from the gardens.

The cash donations that we receive for our Food Pantry, member donations of food and the Meijer's Simply Giving cards are truly a blessing for the Food Pantry at this time when the supply chains are limited, and the cost of food and personal need items


has risen. It allows us to purchase those items that are not currently available through the GLFB and keep providing the basic needs of our clients. We would like to thank everyone who donates in any way to the Food Pantry and want to let you know that all donations are greatly appreciated.

The Food Pantry is seeking volunteers who might be able to assist with the shopping for supplies at Meijer's. There are many staples that we have been unable to obtain from the Greater Lansing Food Bank in the past several months. We are able to obtain these supplies by using our Meijer's Simply Giving cards and have been shopping there weekly. We also receive generous food donations from several families in our congregation each month. The Meijer's cards can only be used for food items and not for personal needs, so we generally pick up those supplies at Sam's or the Dollar Tree with funding from the cash donations that we receive. If anyone would be interested in helping with the shopping on occasion, please contact Bev Johnson to obtain a list of needed items and a Simply Giving Gift card to use or talk with Bev or Tracy Collins regarding the personal needs obtained at the Dollar Tree.

The Food Pantry is still seeking volunteers who are able to work on Wednesday evenings and Thursday afternoon pantry distribution days. If you would like to help, please contact Bev Johnson or Tracy Collins.

You may be aware of the impending name change of Abbot Woods Park in East Lansing to an Indigenous People's name meaning "many cottonwoods." This change is rooted in a growing awareness and interest concerning the fact that we are living on land previously occupied by, and stolen from, others, and reflects an effort to show respect for that. Our faith tells us that the land belongs to God. In the book of Genesis, the Lord gives us the earth to till and keep, i.e. to use and care for.

Many recent publications describe and promote the Indigenous peoples' attitude toward the earth, and ways of living that show reciprocity for the gifts received from the earth. "Reciprocity" is a term that crops up over and over... "giving back" by caring for the earth.

Climate change has reached overwhelming emergency levels. In the likelihood that we are unable to reverse it, we need to be finding ways to live with it. Reciprocity is one of

Heroes and (S)heroes

Who are your heroes and (s)heroes? Every now and again I think about an individual who contributed to the texture of my life and remember them fondly. They might have been someone I dealt with on a regular basis or maybe someone who just gave me a lifeline when I was about to go over the cliff.

One of my favorite memories is about my friend, Dr. Elen Cutrim. Elen was a Professor at Western Michigan University, and I met her when I first joined my church in Portage. She came to the U.S.A. via marriage from a small town on the coast of Brazil.

Elen must have noticed how badly I needed someone to make me feel that I had a friend at the church. She took me under her wing, where there were already a bunch of people hanging around. She mentored me, teaching me how many different ways I could serve at the church. She asked me to work by her side, so we cooked, cleaned

up, delivered food to our shut-ins, taught Sunday School and shared a lot of things that needed to be done.

When my children were with their Father, she'd invite me home to Sunday dinner of some traditional Brazilian food. Around the huge table she set up in the living room were an eclectic group of people from different nationalities, students from college, as well as professors. Her large energetic family and several people from church joined the table celebration. It was hard to believe that Elen could do this weekly.

Elen was part of our church prayer group and invited me to join. We met at the homes of the members and lifted our prayers for our church, our members and the world. Elen loved to celebrate life and she threw amazing evening fiestas like those she remembered from her family celebrations in Brazil. She was one of the most alive and joyous people I have ever known.

Elen was planning her retirement from Western Michigan University and she and her family were building a retirement home right on the Brazilian coast. She found out that she had a very aggressive cancer. The prayer group was requested to pray for Elen and her family. We were asked to visit her, but only in small groups or individually. It was so painful to see her having to give up the Sunday dinners and fiestas. Now when I visited there was always someone else there, making us both a cup of tea. Even that little act of hospitality seemed heroic in the midst of her suffering.

Eventually Elen went to live in a local hospice facility. Another friend and I would visit often. We'd take a guitar and worship, pray and sing hymns for Elen and those members of her family and close friends who were around. When I asked Elen what she needed she would respond, "I want to go home to Jesus." Eventually she could no longer speak and would just point upward. It hurt to say goodbye and I remember the important things that Elen taught me and try my best to celebrate her memory.

Please do not forget those who are your heroes and (s)heroes. Lift them up in prayer and celebrate their memory or honor them while you still can.

## He Leadeth Me

Much ink has been used to answer the question, “How can I know God’s leading?” All of us, in one way or another, would like to know the answer. Somewhere along the way, I heard a Bible teacher say this about God’s leading: “To know His leading, there are three things—the Bible, the Holy Spirit, and the circumstances of life. God will use all of these to direct our paths into His will.” Because the Bible tells us to speak to one another (Eph. 5:10) and to encourage one another (Heb. 10:25), I’m thinking of a hymn that will do just that.

The song, He Leadeth Me, was written in 1861 at the First Baptist Church in Philadelphia, or to be more precise, the house next door. John Henry Gilmore was the supply pastor and, following prayer meeting, was visiting Deacon Watson in the house next door. The members of the church had gathered there and were discussing the pastor’s message on the 23rd Psalm. As Pastor Gilmore listened, he started to write: and within a short time, had completed the hymn. Giving the hymn to his wife, the good pastor soon forgot about it. A few years later, while visiting a church in Rochester, New York, to his surprise, he found his song in a new hymnal the church was using. Apparently, Mrs. Gilmore had sent the words to a Baptist publication. William Bradbury, the Father of Gospel Music, had seen the words and added some music. Thus, a new hymn was born.

It’s been said that music prepares the heart for the message. This hymn does that. In its verses, we are reminded that God’s Word, His Spirit and the ups and downs of life. are used to lead His children—both in this life and even in the valley to the next (Psalm 23).

*He leadeth me—Oh blessed thought!  
Oh, words with heavenly comfort fraught!  
Whate’er I do, wher-e’er I be,  
Still ‘tis God’s hand that leadeth me.*

*Sometimes ‘mid scenes of deepest gloom,  
Sometimes where Eden’s bowers bloom,  
By waters calm, o’er troubled sea,  
Still ‘tis His hand that leadeth me.*

*Lord, I would clasp thy hand in mine,  
Nor ever murmur or repine;  
Content whatever lot I see,  
Since 'tis my God that leadeth me.*

*And when my task on earth is done,  
When, by Thy grace, the victory's won,  
E'en death's cold wave I will not flee,  
Since God through Jordan, leadeth me.*

### **History of Tomato Pin Cushions**

Metal pins are an invaluable tool for today's seamstress, and they were no less so for sewers throughout history. With pins came a variety of ways to store them, including boxes, cases and cushions.

#### **15th-Century Debut**

The first reference to the tomato pin cushion appears in the 15th century. Before this, as metal pins were rare and expensive, they were stored in a variety of protective cases made of bone, ivory or silver.

#### **Tudor Era**

During the Tudor Era (1485-1603) it became common practice to use fancy, stuffed shapes to store needles and pins. The familiar tomato shape evolved due to the folklore surrounding the fruit, which symbolized prosperity and repelled evil spirits.

#### **A Sign of Prosperity**

A custom evolved whereby ripe tomatoes were placed on a mantel to ensure future prosperity. As real tomatoes were not always available, people created fabric tomatoes

stuffed with sand or sawdust. Eventually, the stuffed, decorative tomatoes were used as pin cushions.

### **Victorian Era**

The stuffed tomato pin cushion was further popularized in the Victorian Era. As parlor rooms became more opulent, the lady of the house displayed collections of pin cushions in various shapes (fans, dolls, shoes, fruits and vegetables), taking pride in their number and variety. The tomato pin cushion became a familiar presence.

### **Present Day**

The most familiar pin cushion today is the red tomato. The strawberry tassel attached to the pin cushion is filled with emery and serves to clean and sharpen needles and pins.
