the triumphant entry turns into complete confusion and sadness. The one people had looked at as their hope in life was executed and has been put in the grave. They are afraid and grief stricken.

Food Pantry Report for April 2023 Newsletter

A total of 99 clients were served in February 2023, which meant 35 families were helped. So far since January 1, 2023, we have served 207 clients which means 71 families have been helped. We could not have accomplished this without the support of our congregation and the dedicated volunteers who

work at the Food Pantry.

Between January 26, 2023, and February 25,2023, 1103.3 pounds of food was donated for the Food Pantry from members of the congregation, as well as outside donors from the community. We are very grateful for these donations.

We received good news from Meijer's in March. St. Paul's Food Pantry has been picked to be included once again in the Simply Giving Campaign for spring. The campaign will run from Sunday, April 2, 2023, through Saturday, July 1, 2023. We will once again be partnered with the Meijer's store on Lake Lansing Road. The cards that can be used to donate will be arriving at the end of March and a display will be set up in the Narthex for anyone who wishes to donate. Cards can also be found at the end of the check-out lines at the store. During the upcoming campaign, the Double Match Day opportunity will be held on Saturday, June 17,

2023. For every \$10 Simply Give card purchased on these dates, Meijer will provide an additional contribution of \$20.00, bringing the total to \$30.00 for a single customer purchase.

Volunteers are always appreciated who are able to work on Wednesday evenings and Thursday afternoon pantry distribution days. If you are available and would like to help, please contact Bev Johnson or Tracy Collins.
